While we are not promised the day of tomorrow all we have is the day of today; if we choose to live in the moment we have been blessed with, we will live a thankful life.

Therefore, it is with a thankful heart that we can report on the past few months' successes of Loreto Convent School. The year started off with excitement and cheer as everyone returned from their summer holiday.



Our 2015 Matric group of 76 students had the privilege of writing their matric exam. These learners managed a collective 78 distinctions as well as a 90.78% Bachelors' Degree admission. Our Top Student achieved no less than 6 distinctions, followed by 4 girls each achieving 5 distinctions.

The staff and learners were all keen on getting the year off to a splendid start.

Term 1 was greeted with a Staff Orientation, inspiring everyone to give of their best. A highlight for the Grade 11 learners was the Mass at Holy Trinity. The Grade 7 learners enjoyed their annual camp and our Grade 12 girls had their one night of magic at their Matric Farewell.

The fun continued into the second term with retreats, Bible Quiz finals and the Grade 7 Mass held at Assumption Convent. The School also celebrated its birthday. The second term also gave the opportunity to give generously to the less fortunate by donating to charities of each grade's choice. This gave us the opportunity to give back to the community, open the hearts of everyone and reflect on what we are blessed with.

Heading into the second half of 2016 leaves us with a chance to further enrich and plough into the lives of the learners. The Speakers' Circle dinner for the hardworking motivated girls who diligently attend this course annually, the Women's day celebration reminding us all of our worth as women and the Primary School's Music Festivals, to be held at CBC are all events we look forward to. We would also like to wish our 2016 matrics everything of the best for their final exams and know that they will certainly make us proud.

NEWS OF OUR LORETO SISTERS

Where the Sisters are and what they are doing.

We may retire from ministry but our mission never ends....

Many past-pupils wonder what the sisters are doing now that they are no longer directly involved in the schools so it seems good to share a little with you all. Currently our community in Southern Africa includes sisters in Cape Town, in Pretoria/Tshwane and in Western Zambia. We have had an active website but it is being revamped this month. The new address will be www.ibvmsa.co.za. Please take time to open this when you have a moment and it will give you some up to date news. We also encourage you to visit www.ibvm.org which is our international website with links to the various Loreto provinces in different parts of the world. We have one sister in New York representing us at United Nations with many other men and women religious. See www.ibvmunngo.org She is there on behalf of the worldwide IBVM/Loreto family – sisters, associates, co-workers in our schools and projects, students, parents, and yourselves our past-pupils.

In Cape Town there is still a significant commitment to Loreto School Strand – on the governing body and through support in different ways. Srs. Jacinta Bannon, Marie Brady, Rosaleen O’Kane and Monica Shanley are involved in various spiritual and pastoral ministries – in parishes, in prison ministry, with women’s groups, in healing of memories workshops, in awareness raising and action around human trafficking etc. A small group of Associates is active in the Strand area in recent years.

In Pretoria Srs. Margaret Mary O’Brien and Linda Prest are in Holy Cross Home as they need special care. Their ministry is simply “being”, praying and sharing in the pain and suffering of humanity. While residing in the retirement complex at Nazareth House, Srs. Deirdre Harman, Eileen Gallagher, Emer McNally, Marian Moriarty and Bernadette Wilczkiewicz are engaged in diverse ministries. These include significant engagement on the governing body and committees in both schools and support where possible for staff. Sr. Emer has given much time and energy to the Catholic Schools’ Trust which has taken several years to become formally established. It will shortly assume responsibility for Catholic schools previously owned by four different religious congregations. Meantime the spiritual and pastoral ministries of the sisters in Pretoria are similar to those listed above for Cape Town and also include reflexology, group facilitation, involvement with migrants / asylum seekers / refugees, the homeless and those in a halfway house.

In Lukulu in Western Zambia Srs. Elizabeth Donnan and Pat Harvey have had a great but demanding ministry in education and development, in health and pastoral care since moving to Zambia from Witbank in 2006. In May 2016 they welcomed Sr. Lenah Mambo,

one of our Kenyan sisters, who is now teaching in a local high school in Lukulu. They recently visited us in SA. We usually gather on an annual basis for a meeting and to have time together.

In June 2017 Pretoria will be the venue for an International Loreto Schools' Conference. This is being jointly planned by the three Loreto Schools in SA in liaison with others from a few different countries. They connect with the planning committee online. We expect more than 60 participants.

From this outline it is evident that retirement has a different meaning for sisters! The possibilities are endless for living out the charism of Mary Ward who encouraged us to do ordinary things well and to do all for the glory of God. We cannot all be Mother Teresas but each one makes a difference in others' lives daily. We acknowledge her Loreto roots and rejoice with Mother Teresa's Sisters as they celebrate her canonisation on 4th September. Sr. Emer will represent us all in Rome that day. We are looking forward to meeting many of you on 1st October.

MARY WARD ENGLAND/TERESA BALL IRELAND/MARGARET MARY JOLIVET SOUTH AFRICA

The year 1609 is considered to be the time when our Institute began. In that year, while she was in London, Mary Ward had a clear insight that she was being called to do something different for the glory of God. In the years that followed she understood that she was being guided to provide for the education of women in ways similar to what the Jesuits were already doing for boys. Thus began a long difficult journey for her as she tried to establish a religious congregation of active, ministerial religious. The officials of the Church wanted women religious to be cloistered, to live within the walls of the convent and not to engage in ministry outside. Mary worked tirelessly to avoid confining her congregation in this way. She was declared a heretic and the congregation was suppressed in 1631.

However, through the efforts of her faithful followers, the call to work for the *care of the faith and the education of women and girls* continued. Gradually approval was given for the rules and constitutions which were based on those of the Jesuits. Schools flourished in various parts of Europe and during Penal Times in Ireland young Irish women were sent to these schools in England and elsewhere if their families could afford it. It was in this way that Frances Ball – later known as Mother Teresa Ball- came to be a boarder at the Bar Convent York in England.

Frances Ball returned to Dublin when she completed her years in school. Shortly afterwards she experienced a call to the religious life. At that same time Archbishop Murray of Dublin

was asking the sisters, followers of Mary Ward, in York to send a group to found a convent and start a school in Ireland. Those sisters of the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary said that they could not do it but suggested that the archbishop send young women to York to be trained. Frances Ball was one of those who went to York for formation in the religious life. She and her companions returned to Dublin in 1821 and they called their first convent and school Loreto – hence the name by which we have been known for nearly 200 years.

The 1800s were a time of great missionary expansion with numerous groups of men and women religious leaving Europe for many other parts of the world to bring the good news of the gospel. Frances – now Mother Teresa Ball - responded to invitations received and during her lifetime sisters went to India, Canada and several other places. This pattern continued after her death in 1861.

Meantime in South Africa Catholic missionaries were moving into the interior of the country. Men religious led the way and among them the Oblates of Mary Immaculate – OMI – stand out. They evangelised large tracts of Southern Africa and still have a strong presence here today. A French Oblate named Jolivet became bishop of a wide area of South Africa including Pretoria. His sister – Margaret Mary – was sent to Loreto School in Navan in Ireland to improve her English. She later became a Loreto Sister and when her brother saw the needs in South Africa he invited the Loreto Sisters to come. So in 1878 Margaret Mary and her companions came by ship to Durban and by ox-wagon over the Drakensberg to Pretoria.....and the rest is history.

For years we looked upon Teresa Ball as our foundress because we were not allowed to call Mary Ward foundress. In the renewal following Vatican Council II (1962-1965) all religious were strongly urged to go back to the spirit of their foundress. We began to claim Mary Ward as foundress from that time. We rejoice that she was declared Venerable in December 2009 and we trust that one day she, who was once called a heretic, will be canonised.

This brief historical outline would not be complete without mentioning that the congregation which continued after Mary Ward's death and was known as the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary changed their name to Congregation of Jesus in 2002. We work closely with these sisters in several places around the world. About twelve of them will come to the International Schools' Conference being organised here in Pretoria next June. They have communities in Zimbabwe. This is the only country of Africa where they are. They are in many countries where we do not have communities just as we are in countries where they are not working. The followers of Mary Ward in the different branches minister today in forty-four countries across five continents.....all for the greater glory of God.

LOG Travellers

- Gracie Pozzo (Skinner 1947) reports from Pretoria on her coach tours in South Africa as follows: Whole Garden Route Experience: We travelled from Pretoria arriving at Breton-On-Sea in Knysna where we spent a few days exploring surrounding areas, amongst others Plettenberg Bay where we joined Ocean Safaris on the open sea to view whales close up. A very unique experience. We were also treated to a ride onboard the "Rivercat Ferry" (also known as "Old Three Legs") to the Knysna Heads. Travelled on to Port Elizabeth (the friendly city) where we stayed over-night before departing for Cradock, staying at "The Tuishuise and Victoria Manor" with its warm Victorian atmosphere. More than two dozen Tuishuise in Market Street in Cradock are all beautifully restored Victorian era houses, each having its own lounge, kitchen and bathroom in its own distinctive theme of period paints and antique furniture. The Victoria Manor is a grand old hotel with décor from the days of Cecil John Rhodes. Then homeward bound, the route taking us over the Gariep Dam wall. Namaqualand West Coast Flower Spectacular: We departed with a Kulula flight from Lanseria Airport to Cape Town. Our luxury coach was waiting to take us to our hotel. Then we visited Cape Town's V&A Waterfront. This old and desolate harbour, developed in the 1990's, turned out to be one of the highlights in the city. The next day our outing took us to

Postberg Flower and Nature Reserve where our first glimpse of the flowers presented us with the most awesome flower carpets imaginable. Then we travelled to, amongst other places, Ramskop Nature Reserve, Nieuwoudsville, Garies, Kamieskroon, then on to Springbok. Along these routes, the flowers appeared everywhere, giving us a spectacular scene of Daisies of all colours – an experience never to be forgotten. Then homeward bound, making a short stop at the Augrabies Falls. Early Christmas in the Mountains: Our accommodation was at the ATKV Drakensville Holiday Resort. We experienced the interesting Tugela-Vaal Project, South Africa's only underground power station. The Thukela River rises in the Drakensberg Mountains, near Bergville, and flows eastwards to discharge into the Indian Ocean about 95km north of Durban. Major tributaries include the Little Thukela, Klip, Bushman's, Sundays, Mooi and Buffalo Riviers (the last mentioned being the largest). Next we visited Mont-Aux-Sources Hotel from where we saw scenes of the breathtaking Amphitheatre and Mont-Aux-Sources. We also visited the world famous Drakensburg Boys Choir. The Choir opened its doors in 1967 and draws its inspiration from the environment of the Champagne Valley where daily can be heard the sound of boys singing. Here we enjoyed their special Christmas programme. The last day we enjoyed the peace and serenity of the mountainous surroundings with a visit to popular viewpoints. Sadly, after a very interesting few days spent in the mountains, we headed for home. Scottburgh Blue Marlin Holiday: On our way to Scottburgh we stopped at Van Reenen, just outside Harrismith. Here we visited the Llandaff Oratory which was built by Maynard Mathews in memory of his son Llandaff Mathews, who died while saving the lives of eight colleagues at the Burnside Colliery Mine on 19 March 1925. In this church he erected a plaque in honour of his son. It is a Roman Catholic Church, which seats just eight people, apparently the same number of people Llandaff saved in the mine accident, and is architecturally based on a wing of the Cardiff Cathedral in Wales. The Llandaff Oratory is a Heritage landmark. It is the smallest Roman Catholic Church in Africa and they have a service once a month. We stayed at the Blue Marlin in Scottburgh. The next day we visited the uShaka Marine World in Durban – the biggest marine park in Africa. Here we were entertained with dolphin and sea lion shows. We were taken to Durban on a second occasion, this time to enjoy a boat ride through the harbour on the "Isle of Capri". Durban harbour is the biggest and busiest harbour in SA. Its 15km wharf handles big freight ships, the Prince Edward Dry Dock and a sugar export terminal of 400 000 tons, to mention but a few. Also we visited the Moses Mabhida Soccer Stadium and Durban Botanical Gardens. Next day we headed for home. While I was in Scottburgh, I contacted Yvonne (Rentzke) Stone (Skinner 1947) who lives in Umkomaas. She paid me a short visit. It was great to see her as we were in the same class at Loreto.

LOG Milestones

Ray Jeppe (Skinner 1972)

Hi!

I was reading all the news and decided to update those who may remember me, about my own life. (I see Felicity Mullan mentioned what I do in the last newsletter.)

I started school in Skinner Street in 1960 and remained there until matric (1972). I then studied to be a veterinarian, and worked as one in Bloemfontein and Johannesburg until 2007, when I joined a Christian Art School (Creare) in Bloemfontein.

I work in Siberia (Russia) most of the time, in a town called Prokopyevsk, where we are busy establishing a satellite Creare school. I teach Drama! I share a flat with 3 other girls, 2 of whom are part of our full-time Creare team. One teaches music, the other teaches dance and art. We spread the Gospel through the Arts. We also present subjects on hearing God's voice, God's Perspective, Spiritual gifts, prophecy, and several others.

I work at a Rehabilitation Centre 3 afternoons a week as well (there are many drug addicts and alcoholics in Russia, and our church here runs 3 Rehabilitation Centres). The girls at this centre have a little business, making food and selling it in small containers. I help cutting up the vegetables or whatever is needed. I speak some Russian but not enough to communicate fluently, and working there exposes me to the language and we are building wonderful friendships as well!

The summers in Siberia are quite hot - the temperatures can go up to 34 degrees C - but luckily only for a few days at a time. It rains often, so the average summer temperature is in the 20's. The winters can go down to minus 50, but last winter the coldest was minus 30. I love the winters. I learned a lot of things I never knew about snow - not all snow can be made into snowballs or snowmen!! There are forests everywhere in Russia; all towns are surrounded by forests. Autumn is stunningly beautiful, when the trees (apart from the evergreen ones) turn yellow, orange or red.

I am in Mongolia at the moment, as my Visa requires me to leave Russia every 3 months. While in Mongolia, I stay with an American missionary (Yvonne) who has been here for 20 years. We will be leaving for a small village tomorrow, 400 km outside Ulaanbaatar, for a month. She does evangelisation there every year. (80% of Mongolians

are Buddhists.) Mongolia has vast grassy plains (no forests except in some mountains) and there are more horses than people here! The rural people are nomads - they travel around with their animals (horses, sheep, goats and cattle). There are no fences in the countryside (the land belongs to the government) and the people go wherever they need grazing. (I am amazed that no-one seems to get mixed up regarding whose animals belong to whom... In the village, the animals just wander into anybody's yard if the gate happens to be open.) Mongolian tea is made with herbal tea, milk and salt. (Very nice!)

In closing, I would like to say thank you to all the Loreto Sisters who were part of my life as a child and teenager. I am not a Catholic, but I have no doubt that if it were not for the Sister's prayers, I would not be doing what I am today, and I would not have a living relationship with God. Thank you for every prayer!!! The Sisters who worked in the kitchen and laundry were my mother's special friends and were a pillar of strength after my dad passed away. I also remember Sister Sixtus, who used to clean the bathrooms. Although her English was not very good, she was such an example of faithfulness and servanthood, and showed the heart of Jesus through her lifestyle.

So, even though I am not able to attend the reunions, I wish you all well, and I will be with you in spirit!
